hough it may not seem like it, slavery still exists in the United States. Sex trafficking is a form of slavery that is happening throughout the country, with the biggest concentration in Houston, TX. But all of that plans to change.

On November 16, Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FC-CLA) volunteered at the old Bayridge Christian College in Kendleton. The college was bought by Elijah Rising, a Christian-based nonprofit organization, to house victims of sex trafficking.

"We should have the largest capacity aftercare dedicated to restoration from sex trafficking and sexual exploitation. The land itself is destined to bring restoration to those formally enslaved."

Word about the project spread, which then caught the attention of FCCLA sponsor **Audra Grigar**.

"A friend on Facebook volunteered on the weekend at the old college," Mrs. Grigar said. "I suggested the idea to the students and they loved it."

After deciding to participate, FCCLA went to Kendleton to renovate the future shelter. For three hours, the students worked on many jobs at Kendleton.

"We tore out sheet rock in an old house, and then went inside the old library and
