SUICIDE OF TRANSGENDER TEEN DEMONSTRATES NEED TO BE ACCEPTING



Leelah Alcorn, a 17-year-old transgender teen, committed suicide on December 28, 2014 due to prejudice from her parents about her gender identity. Her suicide note, which was posted on her Tumblr and since has been taken down at her parents' request, exposed a lack of acceptance and general abuse towards her identity.

After Leelah came out to her devout Christian parents, they immediately sent her to conversion therapy in an effort to "change her back." This crushed Alcorn's spirit and caused her to start thinking suicidal thoughts.

Lellah mentioned her parents' verbal and emotional abuse in her note, saying "I immediately told my mom, and she reacted extremely negatively, telling me that it was a phase, that I would never truly be a girl, that God doesn't make mistakes, that I am wrong." She also mentioned that after her parents refused to consent to her conversion, she started feeling hopeless because she felt that she would never truly be happy and comfortable in her skin. She elaborated these feelings in her note when she stated, "I'm never going to be happy. Either I live the rest of my life as a lonely man who wishes he were a woman or I live my life as a lonelier woman who hates herself."

Leelah's suicide note should serve as a wake-up call to parents, friends and peers of young trans people. Trans suicides grow exponentially year by year and they aren't going to stop unless people start respecting and supporting gender identity for everyone. A study taken three years ago shows that 41% of transgender or gender-nonconforming people have attempted suicide at some point in their lives, and the number continues to grow.

Nobody should feel ashamed for their gender identity, but it's become normal in our society to make a mockery of the trans community rather than treating them with respect. Many cisgender people don't take time to understand people that struggle with gender identity, and instead turn a blind eye and mark them off as "gross" or "confused," maybe without even realizing it. The truth is, not giving trans people the rights that they deserve only adds to the dilemma. Death rates among trans people aren't going to decrease until there is room in our society for them to be who they are.

The last lines of Leelah Alcorn's suicide letter read,"The only way I will rest in peace is if one day transgender people aren't treated the way I was, they're treated like humans, with valid feelings and human rights. Gender needs to be taught about in schools, the earlier the better. My death needs to mean something. My death needs to be counted in the number of transgender people who commit suicide this year. I want someone to look at that number and say...fix it."

Lellah's plea for equality serves as a voice for many trans people. Complete equality starts with unconditional acceptance and fair treatment for everyone, no matter their identity.

Review ELVIS DEPRESSEDLY KEEPS TRUE TO THEIR SOUND WHILE ABANDONING THEMES OF DEPRESSION



Mathew Lee Cothran and Delaney Mills, also known as Elvis Depressedly, are a dreampop duo from Columbia, South Carolina who have gained quite the following over the past few years through their distinctive lo-fi and home-recorded sound. Though their previous albums have been known to explore loneliness and death, they've made it clear with "New Alhambra" that they've abandoned the underlying themes of depression in their music that they've almost inevitably become associated with.

The second track, "N.M.S.S.," is the first hint at the change of tone on the album. The lyrics "No more sad songs, I will serve no purpose / I love everyone that I have ever known" are an obvious change from songs on previous albums, such as

the 2012 release "Mickey's Dead," which is filled with lyrics like "I ain't ever gonna learn to swim / So when the water rises to my mouth / I'm just gonna breathe right through my smile and be happy to drown."

Though the subject matter on "New Alhambra" is a contrast from

that on previous Elvis Depressedly releases, Cothran and Mills have stayed true to their sound; Mathew's traditional shaky, distorted vocals and the textural depth that the band is most known for are both present throughout the album. It's filled with a variety of different emotions and still manages to keep elements of the material that initially attracted the band's audience. People of Color Deserve More Attention for their Work in the Entertainment Industry



Though mainstream media is becoming arguably more progressive, annual award shows never fail to set us back a few decades. It's hard to ignore the fact that there's something off about the extremely small amount of people of color nominated for awards, not to mention the even smaller amount of people of color actually winning those awards.

Whitewashing isn't a rare occurrence for most award shows. For example, when the 2015 Oscar nominees were released earlier this year, every single actor in the running was white, and out of every movie nominated, only five had non-white directors. This year's Oscars were the whitest since 1988, proving that racial discrimination, even if internalized, is still a problem

in the media over 3 decades

Despite popular releases from many established artists of color such as Nicki Minaj and FKA twigs, every single nominee for Best New Artist and Album of the Year at the 2015 Grammys was white. A total of 31 jazz, Latin-centric, and world music categories were drawn off from the show, though many viewers probably were not aware because those categories were never given screen time to begin with.

Though 2015 hasn't been an incredible year for representation at award shows, the Emmys showed lots of promise in rewarding some of the people involved in making television more diverse. Actresses of color like Regina King, Uzo Aduba, and Viola Davis all received awards, Davis being the only Black woman ever to win an Emmy for Outstanding Lead Actress in Drama. The show was a powerful example of diversity

in the media being rewarded rather than snubbed, but it also makes many wonder if the rest of Hollywood is ever going to follow in its footsteps.

The media can't call itself diverse until it stops favoritizing white people and starts awarding people of color who do the same amount of work, if not more. Snubbing people of color and ignoring their effort is an incredibly outdated act of discrimination. and should not persist into the

Ideally, the industry would realize its errors and begin to strive towards achieving equal representation, but the only real solution to the lack of diversity at awards shows is simply to give credit where credit is due. Covert acts of racism like whitewashing at awards shows need to be recognized and actively put an end to, or else they will continue to be disregarded and no change will be made whatsoever.
