Roughnecks fight to redeem results of lost game last season

It began last November. Bitter defeat in the final seconds of the bi-district game drove the White Oak football team, quite unwillingly, into the offseason. Nine months later, the Necks returned with vengeance. Conveniently, the first game of the season showcased a rematch of that bi-district playoff match between White Oak and Redwater. With hardly a problem at all, the Roughnecks defeated the Dragons 31-7. "I believe that the defense won us the game," senior receiver Brayden O'Neal said. "Early on, our offense wasn't clicking but our defense continued to stop Redwater and force turnovers to get the ball back into our offense's hands." Following the win, the Necks faced the Mount Vernon Tigers. With a very strong defensive performance the team easily put away their opponent 56-6. "The defensive line was strong and stable throughout the game," senior center Caden Bevis said. "What contributed to that is the hard work they put out, and the coaches teaching them how to correctly break down the opposing lineman. Another big contributor is the offensive attack team as they give the defensive line a look all week to prepare for the battle that happens on Friday night." Next up was Spring Hill. In a rivalry game that stretches back 47 years, White Oak would take on the Panthers at home, shooting for their 4th consecutive win in the series. What they found was a whole lot more. Not only did White Oak win, they won 48-0, the largest

margin of victory in the history of the series. Along the way, White Oak's Brazilian foreign exchange student, junior Arthur Nakai, nailed a 47 yard field goal. Tenaha would represent a greater challenge. It would again, however, be the defense that would hold the Necks up along their way to 34-10 victory. "Tenaha's speed definitely

challenged our defense at a more extreme level than any other team previously," junior linebacker Caleb Hampton said. "We adjusted our angles, swarmed to the ball, and trusted our defense to get the job done Friday night." The typically high scoring offense had been held to only 10 points making the total points against 25, four games into the

season. "Our whole defense has a common goal and that's to hold the opponents to a minimal amount," junior safety Brandon Cook said. "That's just what we're out there to do. Our job is to keep the game within reach for our offense." Bullard provided the defense with the toughest test of the season. With D1 athletes on both sides of the ball, the Panthers brought the Roughnecks their first lost of the season with a score of 20-23. "Bullard is by far the best team we will have played this year," senior defensive end Austin Iske said. "They're strong on both sides of the ball, with a D1 receiver on offense. It will be a good test for our team and excellent preparation for Mineola on our first week of district." The Roughnecks took a week off to prepare for the commencement of district competition with the number one ranked Mineola Yellow Jackets. In their last meeting, Mineola won the game 17-20 on a last minute field goal and continued on to the state finals. The Yellow Jackets have risen to the #1 position in 3A Division 1 after three time defending state champion Cameron Yoe fell to the 4A powerhouse China Springs. Regardless, the winner of the coming White Oak game is likely to be one of the top contenders for a district crown. "To beat Mineola we're going to have make to sure we make good tackles," Athletic Director Coach Kris Iske said. "We also can't turn the ball over on offense and we have to find a way to create turnovers on defense."
