Vikings lose in regional semifinals, but finish in top 10 Team falls short of expectations in first year of bigger division

he past three years, the Varsity basketball team has made the state tournament with two final appearances and one final four appearance. But that was TAPPS 2A. This season, after moving up to 3A and facing tougher competition, the Vikings found themselves in an unfamiliar situation: For the first time in three years, the team did not make it to the state tournament.

Even with the leadership of two former Division 1 basketball coaches, the competition was just too tough to beat. After winning their first round game, the Vikings then ended their season, losing in the regional playoff game and falling short of the state tournament.

"Making it to the second round of playoffs was a good accomplishment, but not our goal," said head coach Mark Morefield. "We wanted to make it to state."

The Vikings played their first round of the 2015 3A playoffs on Friday, February 20 against Dallas First Baptist. The team fought hard the whole game and finished with a 51-46 win. The team's defense was solid throughout the game, and Ty Sadler stepped on the offensive side with 19 points.

"After the win, everyone was really pumped and we felt really close as a team," said sophomore guard Hudson
