Cotten manages 25 people in her role at Marc Jacobs. She works closely with several different teams and personalities, and must meet different deadlines, skills she says she learned as a student at Pleasant Grove.

"I'm in a creative field so learning about sketching, color palettes, researching, inspiration, and refinement from Mrs. Brisco in her art classes has been invaluable," Cotten said. "I was also exposed to a lot of that in yearbook with Mrs. Harris. She never told me that I couldn't do something. Instead, she would challenge me to prove her wrong. I think that has been instrumental in my success so far."

But Cotten isn't the only alumni whose experience in journalism has helped them reach a career goal.

For as long as Jonathon Weaver can remember, he has had a passion for sports and live television production, which in high school led him to join PGTV.

And now he's using those skills as Stage Manager in the Studio Directing department for ESPN.

"I signed up for PGTV as soon as I could. From sophomore year until graduation, I spent as much time as possible in that classroom and studio." he said. "Journalism gave me the playground to create and feed my passion for television production."

After spending a year as an intern with the network, Weaver was offered the same job on a permanent basis. Each night he directs the "talent" to the correct spot, gives camera cues and yells out time back from commercials and sounds on tape. This is his dream job.

"It was an amazing feeling when I was offered and accepted the job at ESPN," Weaver said. "It had been a dream career goal to work at ESPN, and I was lucky enough to have that dream with my first job out of college."
