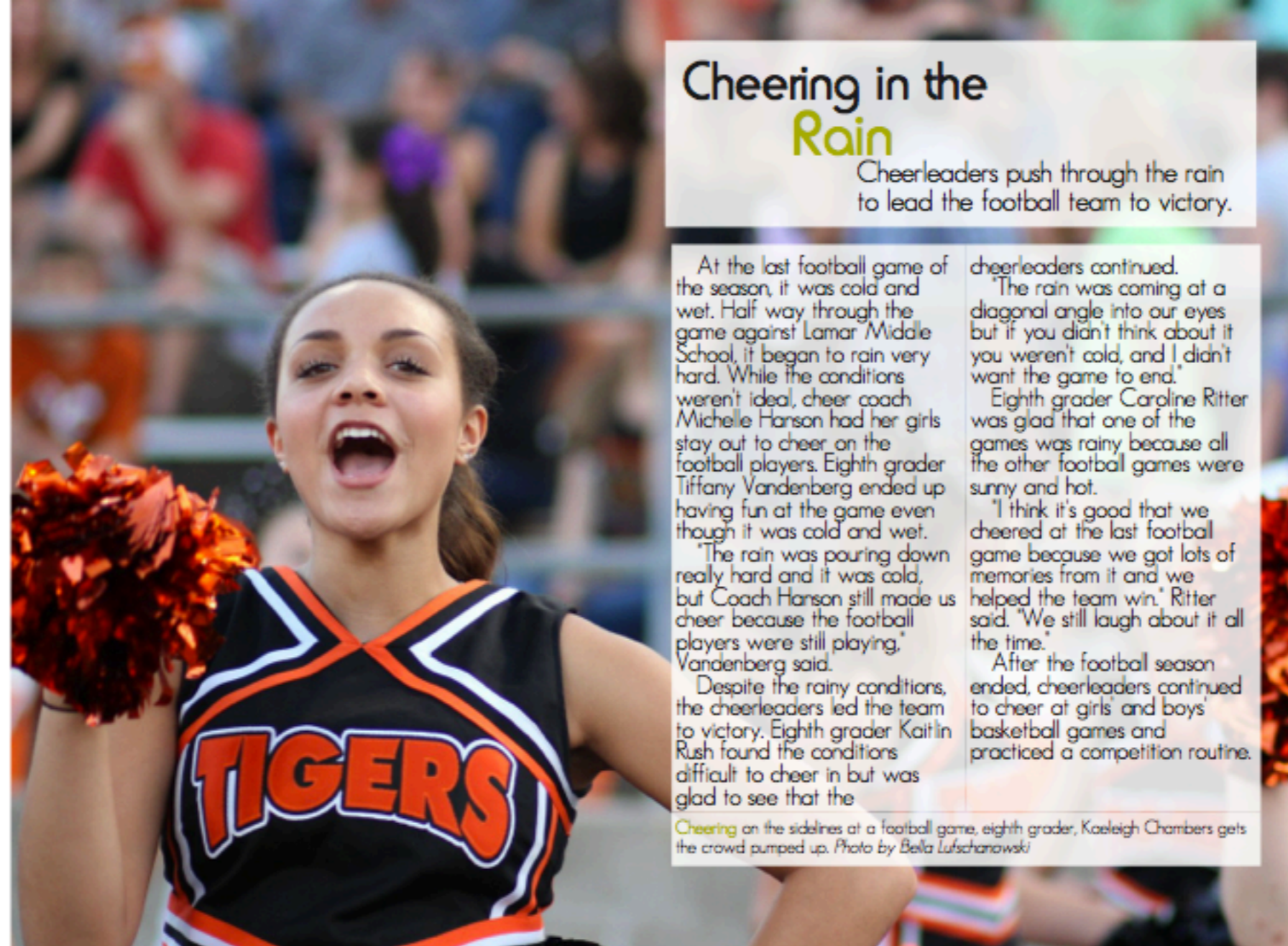

"A pyramid is all the cheerleaders coming together to create one big stunt," Micah Warner, 8

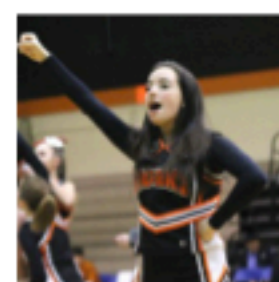


"Charging the crowd means to go toward the crowd to get them excited," Catarina Chavanne, 8
