So what are we waiting for? Let's get going. Story by Matilda Krell



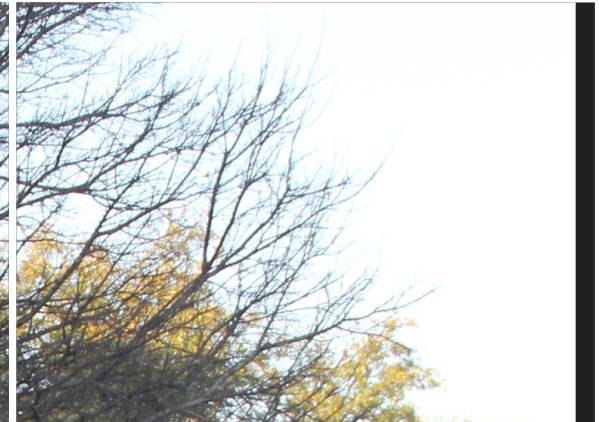
