# Livestock Show Moments

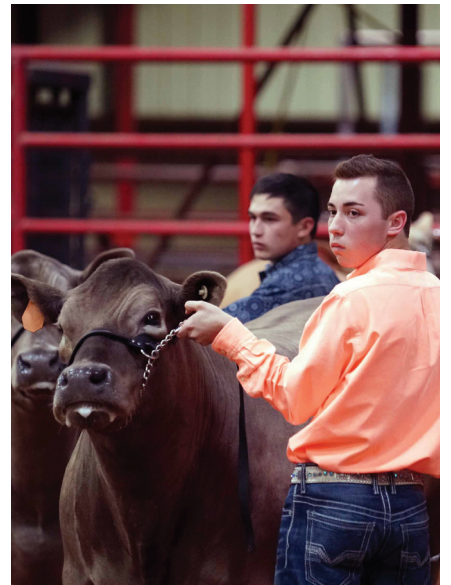

"Chickens are less work because all you have to do is feed them," Hooks said. "You have to 'set' the rabbits (position them), clean them and their pens, and mess with them every day. But, the rabbits are easier to show. You just put them in a box and the judge does everything. Chickens you sometimes have to hold upside down."

Hooks is an active member in FFA and has been involved in the 4H club for three years.

"4H actually prepared me for FFA because it got me ready for competition and taught me responsibility and how to take care of the livestock," Hooks said.

Hooks got interested in showing through friends and family.

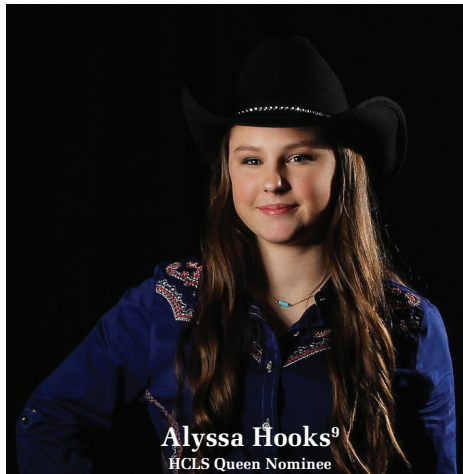
"My cousin Hannah Reeves shows chickens and my friend Kyle Brown shows rabbits," Hooks said. "And I just followed their lead. It looked like fun."

Hooks plans to enter the queen contest as well as show
