Girls' doubles team advances to state, team faces challenges of new region

A new district, new region, and new team bred new champions as the tennis team took state and brought home a medal in girls' doubles. **Cayman Sutton** [11] and **Niki Barham** [11] won third place at the UIL State Tournament in College Station at their first trip to the tennis state championships. The duo, rookies to the division of girls' doubles, also won gold at the regional and district competitions.

"We've always wanted to play together, so at the beginning of the season we begged Coach [Tammy] Cloud to let us," Sutton said. "At the beginning of the year, our goal was to go to state, and we knew we could do it. We're best friends, so we work together on the court, and we stay positive and encourage each other when we are down."

For the rest of the team, the season was filled with success at both invitationals and UIL competitions.

"I think playing in tournaments with larger schools helped our team prepare for regionals and state," Barham said. "At these tournaments, the competition is a lot tougher than what we see at district."

With the Roughnecks advancing nine of the ten possible teams to regionals, a dominating performance at district epitomized the season for the team.

"[At district] we knew that everyone wasn't as talented as us and it made us have the 'we've got this' attitude so we played better," **Kailee Simmons** [12] said. "Plus, we are a close team and everyone was cheering each other on."

The regional tournament, held this year in College Station, brought new woes. Stiff competition from new schools knocked out the majority of teams with only **Nick McFarland** [11] and **Tanner Davis** [11] placing third in boys' doubles and Sutton and Barham bringing home the gold.

"I think the tennis team did very well this season," **Kasey Carr** [10] said. "With only a few seniors this year, I feel like our juniors and underclassmen really had to step it up. Overall, we really did great."

Capping off the season with the successful trip to state, the 'Necks will return all but three varsity players.

"I have high expectations in team tennis to make it to state my last year," McFarland said. "I also hope that as a doubles team we make it to state next year and hopefully come up with a medal. Honestly, I just want my last year to be memorable for Coach Cloud and the whole tennis team together."

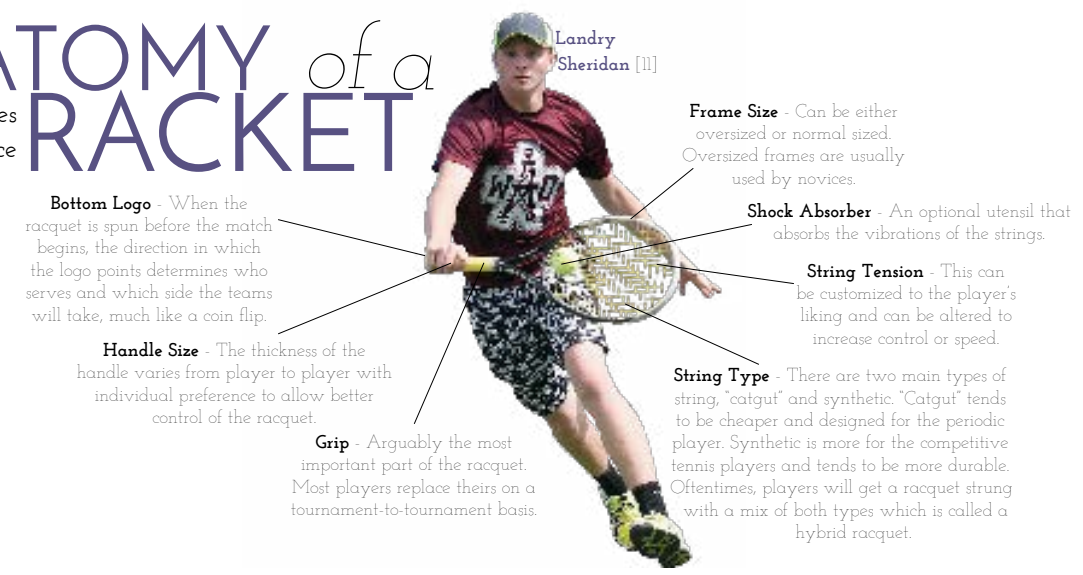
