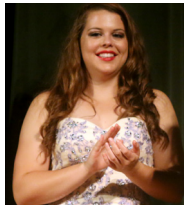

The most significant moment of the season came when Mr. Richard Turner of San Jacinto College attended the group's last performance of *Radium Girls* at the Plaza Theater in Wharton, TX.

"I met Mr. Richard Turner my freshman year when our One Act group attended San Jacinto's clinic," junior **Sara Marie Berrett** said. "He asked what my plans for college were and I told him I had no idea. But three years later, he watched me perform again and that time I had a different answer to his question: I wanted to go to college and become a star."

The university's talented professor commended the entire cast on their camaraderie and talent after their performance.

"I've planned to choose a musical and One Act production for next season that will play to their strengths," McDonald said. "I also wanted to open an East Bernard chapter of the International Thespian Society so that the juniors specifically will be exposed to more opportunities to be awarded scholarships."
