At the beginning of the year, the Lionettes had no idea what to expect for the upcoming season. Graduating seven seniors the previous year left a gap in the team.

The Lionettes made it to the second round of playoffs where they lost to Bryan Adams in a competitive game.

"Playoffs were a really fun experience," JaMiya said. "The end of the Bryan Adams game was hard. The game was on the line and we were all getting mad at each other. If we had worked as a team it may have ended differently."

Despite the initial doubts, the Lionettes finished with a winning record and second in their district.
