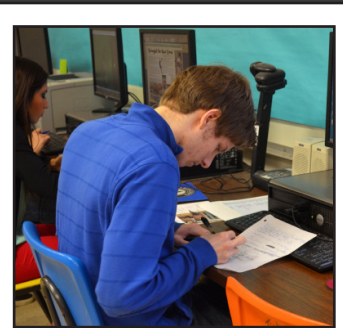

Snap Snap.

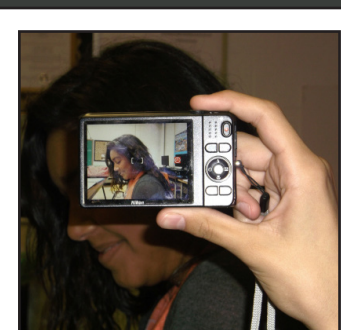
