Needham competes in riding

Junior Josie Needham is a competitive horseback rider, giving her the opportunity to participate in off-campus P.E.

Needham started riding when she was six years old and riding competitively at 11 years old.

"I love riding because I feel connected to my horse, but I also love how it's a way to de-stress," Needham said. "My favorite part is the bond I have with my horse and the trust between our two species."

Needham spends about six hours a week riding, but on average, a total of 25 hours per week at the barn taking care of her off-the-track racehorse, Little Rita.
