pecial education teachers are superheroes to their students. But it took something more than Kryptonite for Ms. Rachel Smith to embrace her calling.

"I chose a career in Special Ed because it was second nature to me, and I knew I could make the biggest difference," Smith said.

Smith led a vocational program where she guided students with disabilities in work settings.

"I teach them skills necessary to be independent and how to think beyond what is in front of them so they are, and continue to be, successful. Whether they are with us at Bowie, at the grocery store with the parent, out to dinner with family or doing whatever. I hope the skills we've implemented are ones they carry on with them. We really push the students to be as independent as possible, to each of their individual levels," Smith said.

There were a wide variety of places Smith's students got to gain experience from.

"On Mondays, we have a group of seven students travel to Clifton, which is a vocational school in AISD. The amazing part about the job-the students are paid. For most of them, they are receiving their very own hard-earned paycheck for the first time. We also have four students travel to North by Northwest restaurant. They set up the outdoor patio and main dining area inside

the restaurant by putting chairs under the table. After doing this, they walk around to ensure all chairs are properly aligned and customer ready. Once that is over, they roll anywhere between 100-200 silverware," Smith said.

Near the end of the week, the students were rewarded.

"On Thursdays, we travel to Gatti Town and prepare their five party rooms. The students are required to take chairs off the table, wipe the chairs and table down, sweep, align the chairs properly, THEN enjoy the buffet. Every other Friday, we travel as a class to West Gate Bowling Alley and join about 10 other schools," Smith said.

While Smith was only with each of her students for four years, she hoped her program's influence would live on.

"My wish for my students after they graduate is they continue a path that allows them to maximize their potential by being continuously challenged so they can rise above and continue to feel proud of who they are," Smith said.
