"I find it not as much as work, but more of a privilege," Bosse said.


Though she was aware that it could get to be a lot, Bosse said she goes into each thing with full dedication.


"I like putting in all my effort," Bosse said. "I was like, if I'm going to do this, I'm going to give it everything I have, or not do it at all."







"It's nice knowing that you get to be there for them," Burke said. "I think it's a special opportunity to go and see them, get to hear what they have to say, and just hang out with them in this last leg of their lives."

While at the home, they played games like dominoes or puzzles, hung out with the residents and listened to their stories. Senior Noah Webster said he loved hearing about the crazy things that happened in their lives.

"There were a lot of stories about world travel and war," Webster said. "One couple said they lived in 30 different countries working as broadcasters and another guy who was in the military was shot and had to stich himself up."

Before visiting the Alzheimer's home, PALS are instructed to be nice, be the residents' friend and make them feel loved. That meant that they had to talk to and care about each individual person and what they
