



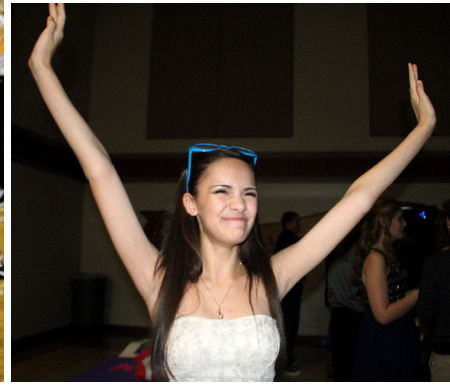

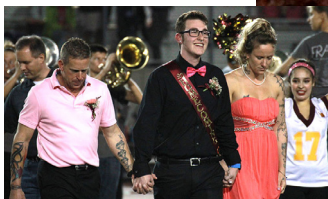

CROWNING achievement

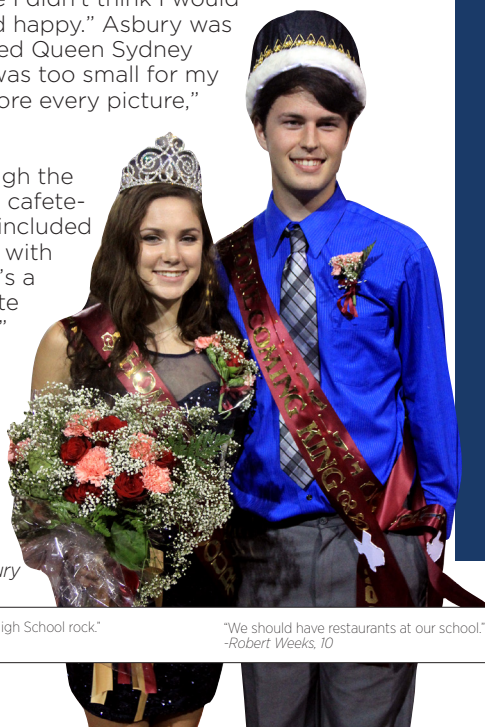
Final two days of Homecoming Week means crowns, disco & guest appearances
